

REQUIREMENTS FOR ENTRY TO THE NURSING PROGRAM

- Upon admittance to Roberts, you may be eligible for admission to the nursing program if you possess a B- or 80% average in two years of high school science and math classes
- Current students must have (and maintain) an overall, science, and nursing GPA of 2.75
- Transfer students must have an overall and science GPA of 3.0 for admission

COURSES NEEDED TO START NURSING 2500 AND 3000 LEVEL NURSING COURSES:

- Human Anatomy & Physiology I & II
- Microbiology
- Intro to Organic & Biochemistry
- Principles of Nutrition
- Developmental Psychology (and its prerequisite, General Psychology)

Students may only retake a course one time to meet the GPA and progression requirements; up to two courses may be retaken in the nursing major, including the sciences, to raise the GPA to meet the requirements to remain in the program; a withdrawal counts as an attempt at a course. Students who do not earn a C or better in two 3000 or 4000-level nursing courses cannot continue in the nursing program.
